



NOTICE OF CONSTRUCTION

As part of the City of Fredericton Infrastructure Improvement Projects, your street is due for curb and or sidewalk renewal this year. If you have received this notice, excavation will start within the next 2 weeks.

What you can expect

City of Fredericton staff begins by excavating the existing curb/sidewalk, and replacing the gravel base.

Within approximately 4 weeks, a private contractor will install the new curb/sidewalk. When they arrive, there will be a period of **up to 48 hours where you will not be able to access your driveway**. This allows a string line and forms to be set up and gives the concrete time to cure.

Following the new installation, City crews will return to replace asphalt removed during the excavation. They will then place new topsoil that was manufactured at the municipal composting facility. A private contractor will complete the hydroseeding within 48 hours of topsoil placement.

The project on your street should be completed within approximately 8 weeks after excavation.

Please note that it is important to water your new hydroseed to ensure proper growth. We recommend daily watering for approximately 10 minutes until the grass is well established.

Why we replace curb & sidewalk

The City of Fredericton has 545 kilometres of curb and 235 kilometres of sidewalk. On average, this infrastructure lasts 30-40 years before requiring replacement. To keep up with our replacement requirements, we replace 21 kilometres of curb and 8 kilometres of sidewalk annually. It is essential to replace curbs before the end of their useful life to ensure that street drainage is maintained. Further damage to the street structure may occur if this infrastructure is not replaced at the right time. Sidewalks require replacement to ensure a safe and efficient mode of transportation.



DID YOU KNOW

The City operates a municipal composting facility at the old landfill site. Yard waste and leaves from the Spring and Fall Cleanup Programs are turned into topsoil used for City projects.
