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
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
Chief's Message

Together, we remain focused on ensuring the safety and well-being of our community, and we look forward to continued collaboration and progress in the year ahead.







Conduct Complaints Service Complaints 16


Types of Complaints

Milestones, Achievements & Community Engagement in 2024

SUSTAINING OUR PEOPLE (EMPLOYEES)

In 2024, our organization implemented the following strategies to increase the exposure of FPF to career seekers to address the challenges related to recruitment and retention of top talent:

- Hosted local recruitment open houses provide information on career opportunities within the Police Force and attended several career fairs.
- Hosted community information booth at the Garrison Night Market throughout summer 2024.
- Initiated digital marketing recruitment campaign leveraging social media optimization to draw in a target market.
- Fostered the FPF Sponsorship Program with the APA where candidates are pre-selected and provided a full-time constable position with the FPF upon successful completion of the program.
- Partnered with the Atlantic Police Academy (APA) in PEI to host an APA Satellite Academy in Fredericton for seeking candidates who wanted to "Live here. Train here. Serve here." This unique initiative has been very well supported by the City of Fredericton Mayor & Council alongside internal departments.

- Actively recruiting non-sponsored APA cadets to complete their OJT (On the job) training with FPF; goal to hire once graduated.
- Piloted AI Technology to the frontlines using Axon's Draft One for drafting reports based on BWC (bodyworn camera) footage.
 - Reduction of time on task for Patrol members and increased visibility within the community.
 - Reduce time on task for Patrol members and increase community visibility

PEOPLE FOCUSED (CITIZENS)

Public Safety Camera project

- ° Currently have 26 cameras installed across the City with an additional 5 cameras with a live feed accessible to the community.
 - Integral to the swift resolution of investigative files, such as
 - Fredericton Public Library vandalism
 - Garrison Historical District arson
 - MacTavish Source for Sports (Queen St) arson

Community Safety

- The City of Fredericton expanded the service coverage of the Community Safety Services Unit (CSSU), civilian security personnel monitoring the activity in the downtown/northside cores and trail systems; reporting crime, responding to business and resident questions, syringe disposal and enforcing by-law infractions. Our officers work closely with CSSU members supporting public safety for residents.
- ° The FPF Community Liaison Officers (CLO), part of the Integrated Community Services (ICS) division, engage daily with community members experiencing homelessness, those living rough and those with addiction and mental health issues. Working alongside FPF's social workers, they partner with community agencies in offering help to connect vulnerable individuals with the resources and services required and offer suggestions to increase their safety level within their current space.
- ° Patrols acquired two additional e-bikes for summer Trail Patrol, increasing our complement to 4. This resulted in increased interaction with the community and patrolling the City's extensive trail network.
- ° CLO continue to promote the 529 Garage bicycle registry by participating in Parks & Trails Day in July 2024 and hosting ad-hoc sign-up days throughout the summer months. Registration is free and enables officers to reunite you with a lost bicycle more quickly.




BUILDING OUR COMMUNITY

Regional Partnerships on Combatting Drugs - Integrated Enforcement Unit

• Established in 2022, the Integrated Enforcement Unit (IEU) the nine municipal law enforcement agencies with the RCMP and Justice and Public Safety Enforcement officers in New Brunswick. Divided into seven (7) units throughout the province, their mandate is a boundaryless collaboration to disrupt violence, firearms, and the trafficking of illegal drugs at the street to mid-level.

- ° FPF members attended the Blanket Exercise designed to build an understanding of our shared history as Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in Canada by walking through pre-contact, treaty-making, colonization and resistance. The exercise effectively educates and increases empathy by engaging individuals on an emotional and intellectual level.

2024 Atlantic Women in Law Enforcement Conference

The 2024 AWLE Conference was held in Fredericton from November 19-22, 2024, at the Fredericton Convention Center. The event, themed "Building Bridges, Breaking Ceilings – Celebrating 30 Years", was a collaborative effort by the FPF, RCMP "J" Division, and the Department of Justice and Public Safety. 




The Guardian Memorial

In 2024, The Fredericton Police Force proudly unveiled conceptual plans for the "The Guardian", a new memorial dedicated to honouring past and present first responders. This memorial initiative comes in response to the tragic events of August 10, 2018, which deeply affected the city community and the Fredericton Police Force.

The proposed memorial will be installed at the central Carleton Street Bridge pier. The pier will illuminate a gentle blue glow every evening at dusk, run fully lit through the night, and slowly recede at dawn every day.



Dr. John Leroux, Manager of Collections and Exhibitions at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery, led a design team with Sean Lee, Assistant Director of Engineering and Operations, and Philip LeBlanc. Their efforts were key in advancing the project and working with community members to bring such a thoughtful concept forward for consideration.

Significant Arrests / Drug Related / Community Updates Media Releases

Arrest 1

April 25, 2024 - Fredericton Police Force's Street and Drug Crimes unit, along with patrols, arrested five individuals in connection with ongoing investigations into several stolen vehicle files.

With the assistance of the West District New Brunswick RCMP, RCMP Police Dog Services and RCMP Air Services, the suspects were apprehended after fleeing from police and causing major public safety concerns throughout the city. The vehicles were noted travelling in excess of 50 km per hour over the posted speed limit, endangering the lives of other motorists and bystanders, at different locations and on separate occasions in the Fredericton region.

The investigation involved several individuals, several stolen vehicles, and several files. The vehicle thefts are believed to have been crimes of opportunity, and not related to a larger organized operation.

Arrest 2

October 31, 2024, during the course of a drug trafficking investigation, members of the Fredericton Police Force's Integrated Enforcement Unit (IEU) and Street Crime Unit, with support from patrols, arrested a 44-year-old male on the City's northside and seized a large quantity of drugs valued at approximately \$63,000.

Arrest 3

June 21st, 2024, the Fredericton Police Force (FPF) responded to a call of a fight in progress on the 500 block of Union Street. Upon arrival, police found a 71-year-old male, later identified as Mark Albert Brooks of Sitansisk, who had been critically injured from a stabbing. Despite being quickly transported to the hospital, Mr. Brooks unfortunately succumbed to his injuries.

Three suspects were apprehended in connection with the incident. Two 17-year-old males were held in custody and presented in court today. Their identities are protected under the Youth Criminal Justice Act (YCJA).



Division Feature - DEMS


The Fredericton Police Force established the Digital Evidence Management System (DEMS) team in 2022 with a mandate to protect the public's privacy and information while increasing departmental transparency as it relates to digital evidence collected by the Force through multiple streams.

The amount of digital evidence generated by the Force has risen 220% from 15,784 pieces collected in 2021 to 50,552 pieces collected in 2024, with every piece managed by the DEMS team, currently comprised of two full-time and one part-time civilians.



• A day in the life of a DEMS team member:

The team prioritizes its workflow each morning, spending the remainder of their workday reviewing the digital evidence raw footage with a lens of redacting portions that would impact police operations or victims and witnesses of crime.



Evidence collected by FPF members, whether it be through body-worn camera (BWC), interviews, internally captured crime scene photos, externally submitted photos, 911 transmissions, or CCTV footage, is uploaded to a secure Canadian-based cloud environment via Evidence.com with specific retention schedules on various file types. In addition to the aforementioned sources, DEMS team also access/manage over 30+ Public Safety cameras around the city.

A process improvement in 2024 alleviated time on task work for Patrol members and DEMS team by introducing Auto-Tagging of evidence. When officers are dispatched by 911 operators, the digital evidence collected is auto assigned the appropriate file number, digital category, and title, through integration between Evidence.com and Versaterm, a record management system.

In addition to processing digital evidence, the DEMS team is also responsible for all training associated with the collection of digital evidence through BWC and the Evidence.com platform.

The DEMS team reviews and processes thousands of hours of raw footage of police response. Because of this, it's critical that team members are aware of how this exposure may affect their mental and emotional well-being. Supporting one another with compassion and accessing FPF mental health resources as necessary is crucial in these roles.


Patrols – Draft One technology feature

The Fredericton Police Force (FPF) is committed to embracing technological advancements to enhance our operations and better serve our community. We welcome innovative solutions that improve process efficiency and reduce the administrative workload allowing our officers to focus on public safety and building community relationships.



One innovative solution engaged by the FPF is a pilot project of Axon's Draft One software on non-charge files with a core focus group of front-line officers. This is an innovative artificial intelligence (AI) tool designed to generate draft police reports based on body-worn camera (BWC) audio. This system automatically generates a draft narrative within minutes of an incident. Officers are required to review and validate these drafts before submission to ensure accuracy and adherence to reporting standards.







Total number of calls for all divisions

Total calls for service (2022-2024)





Intimate Partner Violence and Mental Health Calls (2022-2024)









People Crime (2022-2024)






Top 5 Property Crimes in 2024


